HDA's 19th annual **Healthy Development Adelaide Oration** was presented by **Professor Sally Brinkman**, Professor at Education Futures, University of South Australia and Director of the Fraser Mustard Centre on **Navigating the health and education nexus for the sake of child development.**

Chaired by Professor Carol Maher (HDA Co-Convenor), Professor of Population and Digital Health, University of South Australia.

Early childhood development (ECD) is important to many disciplines, however two dominate: education and health. Each discipline adopts distinct approaches, and while both have their merits, combining them can present challenges, especially when it comes to measurement. The recent policy advances towards universal 3 year old preschool offers unique opportunities to foster collaboration. This presentation aimed to promote an openness to a more cohesive system of support for children and families, ensuring optimal ECD outcomes.

Congratulations to our following Members!



Professor Helen Marshall, Women's and Children's Hospital and the Robinson Research Institute, University of Adelaide awarded the 2023 South Australian Scientist of the Year!

Helen Marshall is a driving force behind translational research which aims to improve the lives of women, babies, children, young people and their families.



Professor Maria Makrides, SAHMRI's Executive Director awarded a 2023 Convocation Medal from Flinders University for her outstanding leadership in translational pregnancy and perinatal health research.



Professor Jozef Gecz including a team of 25 investigators from Australia and Canada awarded \$2.9 million Medical Research Futures Fund (MRFF) Genomics Health Futures Mission to study genetic aetiology of cerebral palsy. 500 children with cerebral pasly will be recruited to define robust and accessible genomic testing pathways to improve health outcomes.

Professor John Lynch from the University of Adelaide's Faculty of Health and Medical Sciences and his research team have received nearly \$2.5 million over four years from the MRFF 2022 Research Data Infrastructure Grant to investigate if the health needs of 50,000 children in out-of-home care are being met.

Professor Simon Barry, WCH and University of Adelaide has been awarded close to \$1.9M over three years under the Bloom Research Program, Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation for a project titled *The SA Paediatric Cancer Immunotherapy Centre: Developing a new personalised immunotherapy for Brain and central nervous system cancers*.

HDA PARTNER NEWS CHANNEL 7 CHILDREN'S RESEARCH FOUNDATION

New research conducted into kids health, education and welfare will receive \$1.2M from the Channel 7 Children's Research Foundation (CRF).

CRF announced its 48th Annual Research Grants Round at an evening celebrating South Australia's remarkable people in research, attended by Her Excellency, The Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, and Mr Rod Bunten, joint Patrons of the CRF.

A total of 18 new children's research projects to be undertaken in 2024 were announced across disciplines including paediatrics, nutrition, mental health, wound healing, childhood cancer, preterm infants, reading intervention, respiratory diseases, breastfeeding, and communication tools.

All research will be conducted in South Australia's world-class organisations of Flinders University, SAHMRI, University of South Australia, Novita and The University of Adelaide.

The CRF independent research committee, chaired by Flinders University Professor of Paediatrics and Child Health Kevin Forsyth, reviewed 97 expressions of interest for the latest round of grants, with the successful 18 projects selected from 47 projects invited to submit a full grant application.



Artificial intelligence as a teaching tool for gynaecological ultrasound: A systematic search and scoping review


The aim of this study was to investigate the current application of artificial intelligence (AI) tools in the teaching of ultrasound skills as they pertain to gynaecological ultrasound.


