KIDNEY JOURNEYS-SUB STUDY 3

During the recent Kidney Festival in Yalata Tahlee and Janet sat with Amelia Ware, an Aboriginal Health Practitioner, and invited her to share her journey through the Dialysis APH training and pilot programme. Amelia works in the dialysis unit in Ceduna and joined the team on the Truck at Yalata for the Kidney Festival week. This also gave Amelia's son the opportunity to go to school in Yalata for a week.

Jared has shared his journey with 3 of the honours students. We look forward to the November meeting when the honours students will present their work to the Reference Team Meeting.

Nari and the AKction team continue to work on system changes to improve the journey of Aboriginal patients who are in hospital for more than a few days or weeks. Nari's journey mapping has been an important tool for opening the yarning.

AKction for YES-Rhanee posted this recently and puts it well

Well about The Voice!

- 1. It is a great idea from the people for the people
- 2. Government needs not medle with how The Voice should be governed and operated
- 3. Who cares if it won't do anything, everything we've already tried hasn't worked either. It'll just be another thing that doesn't work IF, it doesn't work! (Who knows it might work, if given a chance)
- 4. The NO vote gives us the same options we're already stuck with, the YES vote gives us an alternative option
- 5. TREATY is already on the table and negotiations have already started between some First Nation Countries in Australia and the Government. If we haven't been able to get our treaties without The Voice, maybe we'll have a better chance with it!
- 6. Voice, Treaty, Truth in that order is a strategic move. If we're not being strategic with how we move forward into a new generational era, then we're going to be left behind and The Gap will only get bigger (as it already has been)
- 7. No amount of words in a Constitution or no amount of authority that comes from the White Man's law will ever overturn, disregard, take away, diminish or erase Our Sovereign Birth Rights in this land the Others have named Australia.. the Law/Lore of Land stands for eternity and that's what binds, guides and nurtures us in this space. No written law can ever change that!
- 8. Ok, so the referendum happens, everybody votes..... then what! It's either Yes or No..... then what...... we move forward and continue finding ways to work, live and play together in this space on this Earth. The cycle continues and life goes on. The world and relationships won't end after the referendum (unless people get super crushed about it)
- 9. What are our children going to be saying or thinking about all of this, all of us. They're watching and looking and being impacted by everything we do. Be kind in everything you do, do it out of love and not spite, be wise in how you treat others. Our children will watch and they will learn how to treat others through our actions towards each other. Give them good morals to live and love by.



YALATA KIDNEY FESTIVAL

Rhanee, Janet and Tahlee travelled to Yalata and Ceduna with a group of nursing, medical, dental and allied health students for the Kidney Health Festival. The festival first occurred in 2016, as an initiative of the Adelaide University Rural Health Alliance and each year since, a group of students have travelled to the community with the goal of providing education about kidney health, diabetes and healthy lifestyle choices. This year the AKction team was invited to join, and through our collaborative networks we were also able to organise for the Dialysis bus and Dr Sam Bateman to be in community throughout the week for the festival.

Each of the students spent time working with a class at the local school, where they were able to get to know the children and run educational, health promotion activities. They also each had the opportunity to visit the dialysis bus and to work in the local Aboriginal Community Controlled health clinic. These experiences provided them with a greater understanding of the importance of connecting with community when working as a health care provider, providing care for a chronic health condition in a remote location and the importance of being able to access that care on country.

It was a big week of learning for all involved and many of the students have shared their reflections with us about the value of an experience like this, from both a personal and professional development standpoint. Rhanee played an invaluable role, sharing her experiences and insights with the students, teaching them about spirit checks and providing a safe space to ask questions and debrief – It wouldn't have been such a successful trip without her.

We are hoping to collaborate with the students involved to so some more writing about the trip, how it all came together and how beneficial these experiences can be for students study-ing to become health care professionals – so watch this space!

Penny worked on the dialysis truck for the Kidney Festival. She and Fran (manager of acute dialysis at RAH) really enjoyed spending time with students from a variety of health disciplines and explaining dialysis. Our service allowed 5 people who usually dialyse in Adelaide or Ceduna to be home on country for the celebrations. I was also a pleasure to work with Aboriginal Health Practitioner Amelia who joined us on the truck. There is something special about hearing people speak language to each other, even though we cannot understand the words the spirit of wellbeing can be heard.

Billie the Kidney visited us and even tried to drive the truck.
