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Monthly worker profile with Associate Professor Janet Kelly

Associate Professor Janet Kelly also known as 'Nana J' to some of the AKction babies is of English and German descent, and grew up on Kangaroo Island, off the coast of South Australia.

Janet trained as a nurse in a major city hospital and then after a range of midwifery and women's health positions, moved into community health nursing in urban, rural and remote settings across South Australia, working with both Aboriginal and mainstream health colleagues and community members. Over time, Janet sought to better understand what was happening for Aboriginal peoples and to improve the way care was provided, with and for Aboriginal people. She completed a Master of Nursing and PhD focused on collaboration in health care. During this time she travelled to Canada with an Aboriginal colleague, and became increasingly aware of the extensive and ongoing impacts of colonisation, on Aboriginal peoples, and on how health services are structured and function.

Janet has worked across a number of Aboriginal health research projects that seek to better understand the perspectives and experiences of Aboriginal patients, families and communities, and of health professionals and health services who strive to provide quality care. She has co-created patient journey and health journey mapping tools that identify gaps in communication, coordination, collaboration and cultural safety, as well as existing and potential strategies for improvement. These tools recognise the strengths and resilience of Aboriginal peoples, as well as the challenges they face when accessing care.

We thank Janet for always walking beside us, for knowing when to walk behind us and knowing when to walk in front. We also thank her for her ongoing contribution and dedication to AKction and to capacity building all members of the team.

Tuesday 6th December 2022 AKction were invited to accept The University of Adelaide award for Outstanding Achievement, we were the winners for the Excellence in Research (Team). Thank you to all of AKction's Al's, Cl's researchers and clinicians who make AKction possible.

During the presentation of the award it was acknowledged that:

"The Aboriginal Kidney Care Together, Improving Outcomes Now is an innovative and unique research project that is improving kidney care for and with Aboriginal patients by privileging and acting on the voices of Aboriginal patient experts, their families and community members. Based within the Adelaide Nursing School, co-led by Dr Kim O'Donnell and Associate Professor Janet Kelly, AKction brings together patient experts, academics, healthcare professionals, peak bodies and key stakeholders to collaboratively co-design innovated and responsive models of kidney care within and across health and support services.

The team work within a brave space and hold a vision of how their research can (and must) have immediate impact and benefit for Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal recipients of kidney care, as well as the health professionals and services providing that care. They are significant contributors to the inaugural National Indigenous Clinical Kidney Care Guidelines, and National Indigenous Kidney Transplantation Taskforce, both of which are making significant clinical, policy and model of care changes leading to improved access and outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander people with kidney disease. AKction set an example and a precedent for exceedingly high quality, culturally safe research"

Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and Midwives (CATSINaM), The University of Adelaide, Flinders University, University of South Australia and Tafe SA came together to facilitate a two day Gathering to listen to the voices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander AMIC workers, Midwives, Nurses, Students and Cultural Consultants as well as Non-Indigenous workers. The yarning's were about recruitment and retention of Aboriginal staff and focusing on future strategies.

Three themed questions were raised during the gathering:

- 1. What are our strengths
- 2. What are the gaps
- 3. What are our strategies moving forward?

"Our collective of nursing and midwifery educators agree the time is right for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander nurses and midwives to stand strong and yarn up loud to ensure First Peoples voices are heard and their experiences reflected in the future directions of health workforce policy and planning", said **Dr Lynore Geia** from Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and Midwives (CATSINaM) and **Dr Janet Kelly** from the Adelaide Nursing School.

The organising committee which includes representatives from each institution are now in the process of writing report and preparing for the next steps.
