### **Yalata Kidney Festival 2024**

This year, AKction was invited to take part in the annual attendance of the Kidney Festival in Yalata, South Australia. Representing AKction this year was Janet Kelly, Tahlee Stevenson, Samantha Bateman, and Rhanee Lester, along with several medical, nursing, and allied health students from the University of Adelaide. This week-long event included taking part in health screenings, paying visits to various clinics both near and along the way to Yalata and having yarns, listening to the locals about what they need to prevent kidney disease in the first instance, followed by what is required now, to address high rates of kidney disease in their communities.

Previous ventures to Yalata with the University students have proven to be a fantastic opportunity for them to learn on

the ground, away from the confines of the University. The opportunity to take part first-hand in early detection screenings of kidney disease and learning about the importance of Yarning with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, lessons we hope will inform and stay with students throughout their careers that speak up to and can unpack understanding systemic racism in practice towards culturally safe health care.

### **ANZSN Conference**

AKction and some of our Reference Team members were fortunate to have a significant role at this year's Australian and New Zealand Society of Nephrology (ANZSN) Conference, held in Adelaide SA.

Over several days, Janet Kelly, Jared Kartinyeri and Rhanee Lester gave presentations covering cultural safety, the CARI Guidelines, AKction itself and the lessons learned so far. On Sunday, September 1st, we hosted a Consumer Day, a collaborative effort supported by the Australia and New Zealand Dialysis and Transplant Registry, ANZSN, and Kidney Health Australia.

The Consumer Day was specifically tailored to meet the needs of consumers, with a focus on providing information, education, and networking opportunities.

### **ANS Cultural Safety Workshop**

September, also saw an A2RT member Jared Kartinyeri and an AKction team member Liz Rix collaborate in 2 three-hour workshops, where the principles and practice of Cultural Safety were unpacked in-depth. The main educational focus was to expand Nursing staff members' skills and awareness for supporting Aboriginal nursing students as they navigate their degree. This workshop resulted from a survey that Melissa Arnold-Ujvari and Tahlee Stevenson did last year to gauge staff needs and skills for teaching Cultural Safety to all nursing students. As we all

know Aboriginal nurses are the pinnacle of culturally safe healthcare.
