Melissa's work and publications are raising awareness across the nation about the crucial need for culturally safer treatment and care for all our Kidney Warriors. Her work is also educating renal nurses about the 2022 Caring for Australians with Renal Impairment (CARI) Cultural Safety and clinical guidelines. These guidelines cannot make a difference

and improve cultural safety unless renal nurses and other kidney healthcare workers access and follow their recommendations and principles, all of which are grounded in the perspectives and wishes of First Nations communities across Australia.
