Requirements

Available to students who have completed a three year Psychology degree from an accredited institution, including our Bachelor of Psychological Science. Equivalent or post-graduate qualifications will be assessed on a case-by-case basis.

Registration

A minimum six-year sequence of education and training in psychology is required for an individual to become eligible for general registration as a psychologist in Australia. The six-year sequence at the University of Adelaide begins with the three-year Bachelor of Psychological Science, then the one-year Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours), and then with a two-year Master of Psychology or combined four-year PhD/ Master of Psychology. On successful completion of a Masters of Psychology degree, a graduate may apply to the Psychology Board of Australia and register as a psychologist.

Career Opportunities

Psychology prepares graduates for a range of exciting careers that require advanced problem-solving, critical thinking and understanding of human behaviour, such as:

- human resource management
- advertising and marketing
- evaluation and applied research
- mental health services
- youth work
- family and social services
- public and private sector management
- juvenile justice and corrective services
- relationship counselling
- residential care worker
- private sector administration and management
- correctional services

With further study, graduates can be employed in areas such as:

- Clinical psychology—specialising in the assessment, treatment and prevention of a wide range of emotional and behavioural problems.
- Health psychology—learning skills in illness prevention and treatment in public health settings.
- Organisational psychology—applying knowledge of human behaviour to the enhancement of organisational effectiveness, productivity and individual wellbeing.
- Clinical neuropsychology—specialising in the assessment and treatment of emotional and behavioural disorders associated with dysfunction of brain processes or head injury.
- Counselling psychology—helping individuals, families and other groups with issues related to personal wellbeing, interpersonal relationships, work, recreation, health and crisis management.
- Educational psychology—working within schools or the public service.
- Sport and exercise psychology—helping individuals and teams develop the skills needed to enhance performance and enjoyment when participating in physical activity.
- Research/academic psychology—applying skills to the advancement and communication of knowledge relating to psychology.
- Geropsychology—applying practical knowledge of primary prevention strategies and rehabilitation for older people

Degree Structure

Honours Psychology is normally taken as a full-time program over one year. To complete the program candidates are required to:

- undertake an assessment in the compulsory topic “Current Issues in Psychology”
- undertake an assessment in the compulsory topic “Research Methods and Statistics”
- undertake assessment in two elective coursework topics
- attend the compulsory Honours Research Seminar series
- present for examination a thesis that reports a research project carried out under supervision

Honours can be completed full-time (1-year) or part-time (2 consecutive years). Students will need to complete 24 units from which 12 units will be the thesis, 6 units will be 2 compulsory courses and 6-units will be 2 elective choices. For those students studying part time, coursework needs to be completed before the research project, and the research project needs to be completed within a calendar year. Assessment will be based on a combination of examinations, attendance at compulsory Honours Research Seminar series, and the presentation of a thesis that reports a research project carried out under supervision.

Entry Overview

Graduate entry only.

Applicants must meet the minimum eligibility requirements below in order to proceed to ranking for offer:

- Applicants must have completed an undergraduate degree (or equivalent) from an approved university with an overall GPA of 5.0 or higher across all completed courses in a program of study, and;
- The completed degree must be equivalent to an **psychologycouncil.org.au** Australian Psychological Accreditation Council (APAC) accredited three year major sequence of study in Psychology, and;
- Applicants must have a minimum Weighted Average Mark (WAM) of 65% (credit average) across all psychology courses taken at Level II and Level III.

Applicants who have an overseas qualification should supply a certified copy of the assessment of their qualifications by the Australian Psychological Society (APS) by the closing date. You may upload this as part of your SATAC application or submit a hard copy to Level 6, 431 King William St, Adelaide SA 5000.

Only applicants who have met the minimum eligibility requirements will be ranked for an offer based on their Weighted Average Mark across all psychology courses taken at Level II and Level III.

The formula used to calculate this is as follows:

Weighted Average Mark = (Level II Psychology courses x 50% weighting) + (Level III Psychology courses x 50% weighting).

Strict quotas apply.

English Language Requirements

International applicants must also satisfy English Language Requirements for the course through any of the following:

- Successful completion of an Australian year 12 qualification with a minimum pass in an accepted English language subject

Humanitarian Entry Pathway

This degree has allocated a number of places just for applicants who originally entered Australia on a Refugee/Humanitarian Visa.

Humanitarian Entry Pathway application process

1. Submit a South Australian Tertiary Admission Centre (SATAC) application online.
2. Upload a copy of your Refugee/Humanitarian Visa to your SATAC application. Alternatively, you may submit a hard copy within five working days of submitting your SATAC application to Level 6, 431 King William St, Adelaide SA 5000.
3. Contact the Faculty of Health and Medical Sciences Admissions Officer, flagging your interest in being considered for the Humanitarian Entry Pathway - askhealthsc@adelaide.edu.au

All applicants must meet the minimum eligibility requirements as outlined above.
